Thom took us to the open-air seafood market Westwego Shrimp Lot the next morning. We had Riley with us and she was fascinated by the blue crab that had escaped it's enclosure and was wandering around the parking lot. We perused around all the different vendors and settled on ½ bushel of oysters, 2 beautiful blue fish, a whole bunch of very lively blue crabs and the deal of the day 7 pounds of JUMBO head-on prawns for \$5.00 a lb. Back to the house to prep the fish then off to the city for beignets. We found the world famous Café Du Mone and had their classic take on the French delight. The girls in Thomas' family were in heaven and we had to order seconds for them. As far as I was concerned they were powdered doughnuts although dipped into the chicory laced coffee they weren't too bad! We then went to the Central Grocery for their iconic Muffuletta. Thom got a huge chuck and we all sat in the Jackson square park and indulged in the very good sando and the sights of the square. The St Peters Cathedral was in the background and caught all of our attention. We went in and were in awe of the beauty of the 18th century masterpiece. We wandered around on some of the side streets shopping in the quaint little shops. We headed home to cook a very tasty blue crab gumbo and to catch up on some sleep we missed on the long trip over.

We had PO Boys for lunch at Domilise Po'Boys, which had been in the same family for 3 full generations. After that wonderful lunch we headed over to the WW2 museum and spent the next few hours perusing the 5 different buildings that composed the museum. Our youngest was totally fascinated with the building that had a number of different planes from the era hung from the ceiling with 3 or 4 story's of cat walks for us to get some views you wouldn't see, definitely worth going to the museum and spending at least a half a day wondering around. Now to the food they served us. We all ordered something different but a number of the dishes came with a piece or two of fried chicken and it was the BEST fried Chicken I've ever tasted!! We all got different sides to go with the entrees as well. I started with the leg and it was juicy and fell off the bone. I went to the breast next and to my surprise it was very juicy and tender. The entire tables food was damn good including all the desserts and cocktails we tried!! We walked back to the trolley and took another tour of the town. We ended up walking the Quarter once more and it was full of individuals on most of the corners with some kind of amplified music playing and either singing to the music or accompanying it with a guitar, horn or some other instrument. There was a young singer on one corned who's voice was angelic and captivating and I stood there watching and listening for the longest time. The following day we had a marvelous brunch at a place in the market district called Gris Gris. It had an eclectic menu and once more everybody ordered something different.
