Roop County Days 2011 Match Director

Hello everyone and welcome to Roop County Days 2011. I just returned from the Hot August Nights car auction at the Reno Sparks Convention Center with good news. Having a few nickels in our Roop County pocket to rub together this year I bought two '58 Cadillac Eldorados for our side match awards. Yep...you will be shooting for a Cadillac this year in two categories. One is our .22 challenge and the other is the Lucas McCain (Top Rifleman) award..

The .22 challenge will be shot through three windows going left to right. Rifle in hands at window "A"...pistol

staged at upholstered window "B"...shotgun staged at window "C". At Beep...engage 10 rifle targets...stage rifle...move to window "B" and engage 5 pistol targets...stage pistol again at window "B" and move to window "C" and engage one shotgun target. are the .22 Roop Rules: Any non-semiauto open sighted .22 rifle may be used. Any open sighted .22 pistol may be used (semi-autos will have empty chamber with five rounds in the clip) and "any" shotgun may be used. Standard velocity ammo is best but all except no WMR but

The "Lucas McCain Top Rifleman" competition will require two rifles...one SASS legal big bore and one pistol caliber rifle. Both rifles loaded with three rounds each...shooters choice...one rifle in hands and one staged on saddle (table). At beep...engage each of the three targets once each with each rifle. Cleanest fastest time wins. The three targets are about 10, 40 and 60 yards away....not too far but I'm going to make you swing a good arc and shoot through some props. We have some good big bore targets but gallery loads are welcome.

I also want to note that we offer "speed duelist" in our side matches going three deep in awards. That's it and don't forget to bring all your toys.

CLAIM JUMPING AT EL DORADO

Next in a series from Harold's Club Pioneer Nevada Supplied by Slow Eddy POT SHOTS AT PAHRUMP

Among the famous dead-shot gunmen of the early west, there is a special niche reserved for one of the quickest on the draw, one of the most deadly of them all. For Gordon Ellis not only dared his victims to draw first, and then moved almost faster than the eye could follow; he not only never failed to hit where he aimed; but he had an aversion for murder. He always crippled his men by shooting them in the leg!

Ellis had sold a borax claim near Death Valley, and then dropped over into lush Pahrump Valley for a visit at Bennett's Ranch. Here were big orchards, fresh green vegetables, and much green whiskey. It was a real oasis to the prospectors and miners from the parched and blistering deserts. Here, as usual, was a large crowd of men getting a brief

refreshment from the arid country. And here Ellis ran into trouble.

The first day he had an argument with a Mexican, and, according to his custom, promptly shot him in the leg. Legend has it that there were many of Ellis' victims in that area in those days, easily identified by a limp or, by crutches. On the second day Ellis had another argument with an Irishman by the name of Pat Shea. Again Ellis made his famous lightning draw, and again he drilled his victim in the leg. But Pat Shea refused to quit. From the floor he described Ellis in magnificent if unprintable language until the gunman, literally dancing with rage, shot him in the other leg and strode out the door.

But too many Pahrump men had an "Ellis-Limp" and this latest shooting was one too many for public opinion. The men blocked Ellis' path and compelled him to return.

Pat Shea was not appreciative and he turned his flow of adjectives on a bystander. This man dared Pat to stand up on his shattered legs and fight, throwing his six gun on the floor. Shea actually dragged himself to his feet and tottered a few steps until he got near the gun. He picked up the weapon and cocked it. It so unnerved Ellis to see his victim walking with a loaded gun that he dashed for his horse, hitched at the doorstep. Shea called on Ellis to come out from behind the horse, as he did not wish to injure the animal, but Ellis in a sudden panic, tried to hide behind the terrified and plunging mare.

Thoroughly upset by now, Ellis tried a fast pot shot from behind the horse and hit Shea in the groin. But the bleeding Shea refused to fall. Propping himself, he calmly fired two times in rapid succession, the first doing little damage, but the second drove Ellis to the alkali ground in his death throes. Then Shea slowly slumped to the door sill, but again pushed himself up in a sitting position. Weak from loss of blood, he took both hands to lift the heavy six gun to aim The barrel wobbled, and the crowd of excited men were surging to and fro across his line of fire. Impatiently he called to them to get out of his way so he could get another shot

But Ellis, dying at the feet of his horse, heard him, and called out, "Don't let him shoot. I've got enough." And almost immediately he died. Shea recovered, Volume 17 Issue 8 August 2011 Page 3 of 8

but there was no arrest, and no trial. The men found \$100 on Ellis' body, which, the records say, was "just enough to pay for a proper burial." And since that day the "Ellis-Limp" has disappeared from Pahrump Valley.

GHOST TOWN RHYOLITE IS SITE OF STATE'S LAST BIG GOLD RUSH

Rhyolite was born in the early days of the 20th century at the site of what would probably be the last big gold rush in the state.

It all started on a hot summer day in 1904. Eddie (or Ernest) Cross, a 20-year-old from Iowa, was traveling across the desert, not far from Death Valley, with prospector Frank "Shorty" Harris when he found a greenish frog-shaped rock.

They were 120 miles north of McWilliamstown, a newcomer settlement that would later become Las Vegas. To register the claim they named Bullfrog, they would have to travel 75 miles north to

Goldfield.

By the time Harris left Goldfield, he had either sold or gambled away his half interest in the new mine, leaving him with only \$500 and a mule. He continued to prospect for the rest of his life.

Cross later sold his share in the Bullfrog mine for \$125,000. He moved to a ranch in San Diego and lived there until his death in 1958.

Rhyolite would survive less than 20 years, but would leave as its legacy the ruins of its magnificent buildings.

Dream city

Just after the new year of 1905, Pete Busch, an opportunist, stood on a slope overlooking the mining camp of Bonanza and decided it was there a modern city should be built. It was to be called Rhyolite, after the indigenous rock in the area.

Within a year, his dream became a reality as large two- and three-story buildings lined the budding town's main street, appropriately named Golden Street.

The town grew rapidly, and by the next year, its population was 3,000. The metropolis had three railroads, more than 20 hotels, 45 saloons, an opera house, electric streetlights and its own stock exchange.

The need for a schoolhouse was evident

from the start. In February 1905, there were five school-aged children in the new town. By October, there were 38 children. A little more than \$200 was netted through fundraising, and a small school was built. It didn't last long. It was all but demolished

during a windstorm.

More fundraising helped build a better one. But Rhyolite was continuing to grow. With only one teacher and 74 students, many had to be turned away.

Finally, in 1907, an election funded \$20,000 for the construction of a worthy schoolhouse. It opened in 1909, but Rhyolite already was in its downward slide. Soon there was no one left to pay for the

huge debt that remained. It wasn't until 1978 that the residents of Beatty paid off the debt.

Scraping the sky

There were four banks operating in Rhyolite during its brief life. But only the ruins of the John S. Cook bank still grace the hillside. Building began in October 1905 and was completed in 1907 at a cost

of about \$90,000, but by then, Rhyolite had reached its peak. The bank closed in 1910.

Learning of Cook's plans to erect this three-story bank, John Overbury decided to make his nearby building just as tall.

Across the street from the Overbury building are the ruins of the HD & LD Porter Store. Built in 1906 for \$10,000, the store offered just about everything -- everything but whiskey was its slogan.

There were three bottle houses built in Rhyolite. The only one remaining was built by Tom Kelly, a saloonkeeper, who came up with an inexpensive way to pursue his dream of building his own home and,

though he never realized it, a way to recycle. With mortar and more than 30,000 bottles, he built a home that still stands today. Most of the bottles he used formerly held beer or whiskey, although a few were medicinal bottles.

Five-year run

Rhyolite's life was brief. Although every canyon was lined with claims, few would turn into mines. The Montgomery-Shoshone would be the biggest. The expense of mining and milling the ore of many of the

mines proved too costly. Also, much of Rhyolite's wealth revolved around Wall Street. The city's fate was sealed with the panic of 1907.

As quickly as they had come, most people left Rhyolite. By 1910, there were fewer than 700 people left in town. By 1922, only one resident remained.

Today, the bottle house and the ruins of the multistoried buildings, train depot, jail and walls of other buildings are all that remain Volume 17 Issue 8 August 2011 Page 4 of 8


