

EMPIRE CITY

From NEVADA GHOST TOWNS & MINING CAMPS By Paher

Empire City, one-half mile south of US 50 at a point 3,34' miles east of Carson City.

As early as 1855 a ranch with station and tavern known as Dutch Nick's was opened on the north bank of the Carson River overland travelers. Its proprietor, Nicholas Ambrose, moved to Johntown about 1857 and then to Six Mile Canyon the next spring where he set up a saloon-boarding house in a large tent, charging the miners \$14 a week for food and blankets. The small frame establishment he erected in 1859 at Gold Hill was that camp's first building. Nick then returned to the sage desert he knew five years earlier to operate a commodious hotel on Main Street of the new town of Empire City.

Streets and lots were surveyed in March 1860, and the rapidlygrowing town thrived on silver mining and logging. The town soon was given the nickname of "seaport" because of the waterborne traffic in timber which was driven down the Carson River, having first been hauled over the mountains from groves in Alpine County and the Lake Tahoe area. Great booms caught the wood on the river, sawmills cut it for timbering the mines, construction and fuel, and local wood yards stored it for wagon delivery to the Comstock.

Quartz milling began in 1860 after completion of a small mill. During the next three years three important mills were constructed: the 44-stamp Mexican, Mead's with 16 stamps, and Baldwin, 16 stamps. In 1863 J. Ross Browne noted that quartz mills and sawmills completely usurped the banks of the Carson River, and that the "hammering of stamps, the hissing of steam, the whirling of clouds of smoke belching from tall chimneys, and the confused clamor of voices from a busy multitude" all reminded him of a manufacturing city. By the mid-1860s the lumbering activity overtook the important Galena-Washoe City area in furnishing cut wood for Virginia City while the Carson River mills assumed most of the Comstock milling.

Empire City had grown to extend three-fourths of a mile by a halfmile, and it contained stores, hotels. real estate offices. carpenter shops, grocery stores, post office and several saloons. Large stables and blacksmith shops occupied the south side of town near the river for easy access for watering stock. A fine public school served this town which had over 700 inhabitants during peak times, between 1865 and 1875.

The Virginia & Truckee Railroad was completed through here in 1869 and in the next year lumbering activity decreased somewhat because a large wood yard opened south of Carson City. But the railroad brought increased business to the local quartz mills and they were enlarged to handle the carloads of ore that came on the downhill runs. Quartz milling reached its peak in the early 1870s. With the decline of the

Comstock in 1878, Empire City also diminished and the town had only 150 in the 1880 census. The post office closed in 1910 and only one family remained in the 1960s.

BANDIT JACK HARRIS

Pioche in the seventies was considered one of the toughest camps in the west, and not without reason! Hired gunmen were imported at the rate of about twenty a day during boom times to fight mining claim encroachments. It wasn't a healthy spot for a man who couldn't use a gun! As if to lay claim to the sobriquet of "toughest town," early day residents used to point with pride to Boot Row where seventy-five men were buried before anyone in the roaring mining town died a natural death.

But, like any western camp, there was a lighter side to Pioche history, probably best revealed in the exploits of Bandit Jack Harris: Jack, it seems, had a penchant for robbing Wells Fargo Company stages. The rumbling express wagons normally carried a good deal of coin to meet the mine payrolls, and Harris found it a fairly simple matter to waylay the stages on their way to Pioche and relieve them of sizeable amounts of cash. Jack Harris had a way of appearing so unexpectedly that gun play was seldom necessary.

Stage drivers who travelled the Pioche run and the Wells Fargo agent in that town were mighty positive that Jack Harris was the bandit who was causing all the difficulty but they were never able to actually pin any of the incidents on him

The station agent hit upon a plan: it would be much less expensive for Wells Fargo to pay Jack Harris a stipulated weekly sum provided he would be waiting on the express company's porch when each stage arrived. In that way the frequent robberies would be eliminated, and since Wells Fargo was doing a bangup business, it could easily afford the payments to Harris. When approached with the proposition, Harris immediately agreed. He didn't want anyone to doubt his respectability, so day after day he arrived at the express company station a

few moments in advance of the stage. When the vehicle drew up to the porch Harris would be waiting there with the agent, a thin smile playing about his lips. Despite this tidy arrangement, the station agent was baffled to discover that the robberies continued at frequent intervals, yet Bandit Jack was always waiting on the porch when the harried Wells Fargo driver drew up to report a robbery.

Jack Harris was keeping his bargain insofar as reporting daily in advance of the stage's arrival, but the station agent didn't know that Bandit Jack still plied his trade. Some few miles before the express wagon reached Pioche, Jack would waylay it, relieve the driver of the valuables and then race back to Pioche by a shortcut in time to be waiting on the porch when the stage arrived.

It was some time before the agent discovered he had made a bad bargain, since nothing in the agreement mentioned the primary purpose which was to put a stop to stage robberies. And then, with its customary vigor, Wells Fargo Company took precautions again against robbery.


